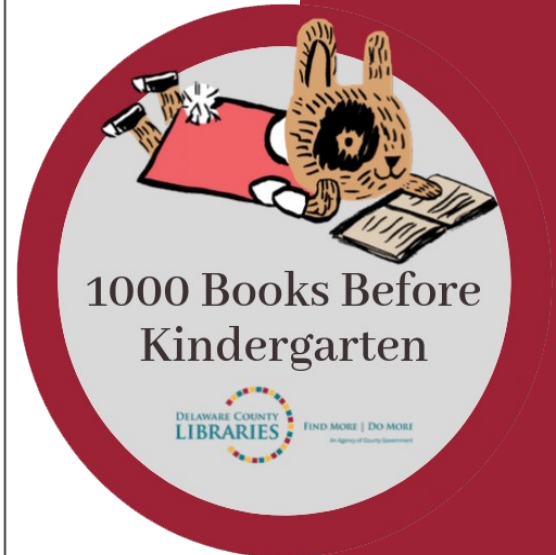

## Program Basics

The 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program is a nation-wide challenge that encourages parents and caregivers to read regularly with their children beginning at birth.

Take a look at how reading just 1 or 2 books per day gets your child to the goal of hearing 1,000 books before Kindergarten!

## Why Participate?

Research has shown that one of the most reliable predictors of school success is how often a child is read to during the early years. Reading to children from an early age can develop vocabulary, increase letter recognition and improve comprehension and narrative skills that are essential for learning to read. Most importantly, sharing books with children promotes a lifelong love of books and reading!



## Getting Started

Sign up at one of our participating libraries (listed on the back flap) to receive your first log or download the app.

Read your own books, check-out individual library books, or check out one of our 1,000 Book Backpacks stocked with 10 books and early literacy tips. Then read and record!

Some libraries are offering incentives and recognition for reading milestones, so check with your local library about the way their program is run.
